Mrs Roelien Taylor joined the staff of Collegiate in August 2001, bringing with her a passion for teaching and an exceptional talent for needlework. Over the years, she expanded her expertise to teaching Technology and Consumer Studies: Clothing, always with the same dedication and care that defined her career.

From 2002 to 2006, Mrs Taylor served as the teacher in charge of rowing, where her commitment was nothing short of remarkable. She would rise at 4 a.m. to take the rowing girls down to the Swartkops River, never once complaining, even when on many rowing trips up country to various regattas and SA Schools Rowing Champs.

She also coached netball and athletics, managed water polo, and served as the Grade Eight Head for a number of years.

Her caring nature and approachable demeanour helped new Grade Eights feel at home, guiding them through the often-daunting transition into high school.

Mrs Taylor's talents as a seamstress are exceptional. She has made countless costumes for musical productions like *The Mikado, The King and I,* and *South Pacific,* spending long hours and late nights working out of love for the school. Her skill and creativity extended to designing and making stunning Matric farewell dresses, not only for our girls but for daughters of staff members and learners from other schools.

As the House Mother of Queen Victoria House for a few years, she provided the Vicky girls and House Captain guidance and support and was the biggest cheerleader when Vicky won inter-house events and the House of the Year Cup.

Mathematics Achievers

Jennifer Friskin (Grade 11), Olivia Freercks and Elizabeth de Kock (both Grade 9) were selected to take part in the South African Mathematics Team Competition, on 14 September 2024.

The junior team was placed 14th in the country out of 48 teams and the senior team, captained by Jennifer Friskin, was placed 16th out of 55 teams. Each learner received a certificate of participation.

Grade Twelve Trial Examinations

We are immensely proud of our Grade Twelve learners who wrote their trial examinations with fortitude. The Bachelor Passes rate was 94%, and our challenge to the Grade Twelves is to attain a 100% Bachelor Pass rate in the final NSC examination. We have 212 Subject A's and eighteen learners attained a A aggregrate, with many close to achievement.
